IIMC Conference News

The conference officially opened on Monday, May 19th, with a "Parade of Flags" where each member state and country has a representative carry their respective flag in a procession to the front of the room. During the practice for this parade I met many other state presidents and really enjoyed the conversations that we shared. The keynote speaker was former U.S. Ambassador and Mayor of Atlanta Andrew Young. Much to everyone's surprise, the Geor-

Lenoir & Reidsville, North Carolina

Being an ‘All-America City’

Congratulations to the cities of Lenoir and Reidsville, North Carolina for being named “All-America Cities” by the National Civic League.

Some 200 applications were received by the National Civic League for what has been described as the “nobel prize” for cities. Seventeen municipal or county finalists were named for the coveted award, but only 16 made it to Tampa, Florida, for the presentation Thursday, June 5. One finalist dropped out because that city said it couldn’t get ready in time.

The finalists have only five to six weeks to prepare their presentation, make travel plans and do the hundreds of “little things” — including fund-raising — to make the trip. Once there, the different groups participated in orientation, made their presentations, took part in a civic fair and waited for the banquet June 6 when the ten award winners were announced.

While I can only speak for Reidsville, I believe Lenoir also received advice from 2007 All-America City Hickory, North Carolina in preparing its presentation. North Carolina has always been well presented at the AAC conference. Clinton also won the award in 2007.

The purpose of this article is three-fold. First, I wanted to explain why the June newsletter was late in coming out this month. I couldn’t work on our AAC presentation and get *Minute-by-Minute* out in a timely manner. A special thanks to NCAMC President Josann Campanello for letting me have a little longer to get the newsletter out.

Secondly, I wanted to “toot the horn” for Lenoir and Reidsville. Both cities worked extremely hard on their presentations, and it was reflected by the judges’ decision. Luckily, Reidsville had its name called second after Akron, Ohio. Lenoir had to wait a little longer, being the 10th and final city called. When their name was called, our delegation jumped up and yelled along with Lenoir, shouting “North Carolina.” We were proud that for a second year in a row,

two municipalities from North Carolina received the award.

Thirdly, and most importantly, I wanted to encourage other cities in our wonderful state to apply for this prestigious award. The National Civic League application seeks three projects from the community worthy of highlighting. For us, it was humanitarian efforts such as our Free Clinic of Rockingham County, the Reidsville Outreach Center and the Reidsville Teen Center. For Lenoir, their projects were downtown revitalization, the Caldwell Health Access Program and the James C. Harper School of Performing Arts.

Many naysayers are quick to ask, what makes Reidsville or Lenoir an All-America City? National Civic League presenters stressed that the award doesn’t mean your city is perfect. It means your city has acknowledged that it has problems and has worked to find solutions to those problems. Oftentimes, these solutions can be replicated in other towns and cities across the United States.

It was truly a bonding experience. While I knew the City officials who went, it was wonderful talking and hanging out with the clients from our various organizations. It made each of us realize how wonderful we have it after listening to stories of people unable to get health insurance or food and medications. The youth from our Teen Center really touched us and the judges with stories of how they have had to fend for themselves but haven’t wanted to take to the streets and lives of drugs and crime.

I believe if your community has three worthwhile projects and is willing to put the time and effort into preparing the application, you will definitely reap the benefits. Please consider doing so. Save water, Save money

The Town of Erwin has been one of the towns in a severe stage of drought this year. Our County, along with all 100 North Carolina counties, had to impose immediate water conservation measures. With a hot summer upon us, it is definitely time to get serious about implementing water saving techniques.

I received this article from our Local Government Federal Credit Union and wanted to share these 10 tips to help your area conserve water and save you some money, too.

1. Check faucets and toilets for leaks—they can account for up to 15 percent of all household water use. Read your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter does not read exactly the same, there is a leak. Find it and fix it!
2. Place a water-filled bottle or brick in your toilet tank to reduce the amount of water needed to fill it.
3. Take short showers instead of baths. A bathtub holds up to 50 gallons of water, while a five-minute shower uses 10-20 gallons. Short showers also conserve energy used for heating hot water.
4. Install low-flow fixtures. Toilets will conserve up to four gallons per flush, while showerheads and faucet aerators can reduce water flow by up to 50 percent.
5. Wait until you have a full load of dishes or laundry to wash a load. Running the dishwasher uses around 25 gallons of water per wash; the washing machine uses anywhere from 30-35 gallons.
6. Buy or build a rain barrel. These are simple devices that catch rainwater runoff from your gutters. Then use this supply for watering your lawn or garden.
7. Mulch your plants. A couple of inches of mulch not only helps the soil retain moisture for your plants, but it also protects roots and inhibits weeds.
8. Set lawn mower blades an inch or two higher. Taller grass means less evaporation and less need to water the lawn.
9. Cut down on washing your car at home. If you must wash it, go to a commercial car wash where computer controlled systems and high-pressure nozzles and pumps minimize water usage. Many also recycle and reuse the rinse water.
10. Share water conservation information with friends and neighbors. Others will be surprised that just a few easy changes can make a big difference.

Cutting back on the amount of water you use may seem like a difficult task at first, but once the habits kick in—and your utility bills begin to go down—you'll probably find conserving water is something you'll want to do year-round.

Meeting in Atlanta

The following statement was read at the meeting:

"At their Annual Meeting in Atlanta, the IIMC Board of Directors spent the first portion of their meeting discussing IIMC's education philosophy, purpose, policies and the need to involve all members of the IIMC "family" in discussions and changes affecting education.

As part of the discussion, directors shared the perspective of the role of membership and leadership regarding education; that education must be attainable and flexible; that it must be meaningful and measureable; and that education is a vehicle that em-

powers Clerks.

The Board is also cognizant of on-going concerns with the education program guidelines and unanimously voted to immediately implement the following items:

- Reduce the MMC annual point candidacy requirements from 12 to 6;
- Eliminate the bachelor degree requirement for MMC certification; and

Extend the "grace period" to complete CMC and MMC certification programs through 2009.

Education discussions will be on-going and will include a membership survey in upcoming months.

The Board's actions are a concrete signal to members that IIMC's existing CMC and MMC programs will continually be evaluated and researched, keeping the members' education endeavors as its first priority."
